What Each Part Does

You will go through some or all of these steps, depending on your personal circumstances.

Part 1. You and Your Residence. Here, you provide a bit of personal information about yourself, including your state of residence. Your document will be tailored to the law of your state.

Part 2. Your Family. In this part, you provide information about your relationship status, children, grandchildren and pets. If you have children you can name a personal guardian for them.
